

1. The role of maritime transport in regional economic cooperation and integration in Asia and the Pacific


- More than 80% of world trade is transported by sea
- Asia-Pacific region represents the largest portion of global seaborne trade:
 - Accounts for 59% unloading and 40% loading cargoes in global seaborne trade
 - Homes 20 of the world's top 30 container ports
 - Shares 56% of global maritime container traffic
- A crucial role in response to Covid-19 and other global crises, ensuring supply of essential goods, e.g., food, energy, particularly for developing countries in Asia and the Pacific
- Dominant position in major shipping activities, including shipbuilding, ship owning and ship scrapping industries



2. Challenges of the Asia-Pacific developing countries

1) Connectivity gaps

- Huge differences between the countries in Asia and the Pacific
- Vicious cycle of low traffic volume and unstable service in the Pacific

2) Common challenges

- Lack of funding and technologies due to changing requirements and growing demand on infrastructure
- Shortage of human resources and gender issues
- Scarcity of environmental and social regulations and Weakness in implementation of global legal frameworks, e.g. IMO Regulations on addressing climate and marine environment issues

3. ESCAP's efforts on promoting sustainable maritime transport (1)

Intergovernmental process

- ESCAP resolution (ESCAP/RES/76/1): "Strengthening cooperation to promote the conservation and sustainable use of the oceans, seas and marine resources for sustainable development in Asia and the Pacific"
- ESCAP resolution (ESCAP/RES/78/3): Implementation of the Ministerial Declaration on Sustainable Transport Development in Asia and the Pacific

Analytical work

- Commission session theme study on "CHANGING SAILS: Accelerating Regional Actions for Sustainable Oceans in Asia and the Pacific (2020)
- Analysis of maritime connectivity and resilient ports in ASEAN and Small Island Developing States in the Pacific (2021-2022)

Capacity building and technical assistance

- Sustainable maritime session during the ESCAP's annual Ocean Day
- United Nations Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework; A process to mainstream the maritime sector (Thailand, August 2019; Fiji, April 2020)

CURRENT PROJECTS

Sustainable maritime and port connectivity for resilient and efficient supply chains in the aftermath of COVID-19

- Facilitating sustainable and resilient port development to support sustainable maritime connectivity in Asia and the Pacific
- Improving the safety of navigation and the sustainability of shipping through the introduction of innovative autonomous shipping technologies in the Asia-Pacific region
- Improving the management of dangerous goods (DG) operations in the port areas in Asia and the Pacific to support sustainable maritime connectivity

Transport Committee (Every two years)



Ministerial Conference on Transport (5 years)

Commission Session (Every Year)

- Working groups (road, rail, dry port): Review the regional progress along the regional transport network, based on intergovernmental agreements among member countries
 - Regional dialogues: Review and develop works on sustainable and resilient port development to support sustainable maritime connectivity
- **Transport Committee:** Review RAP implementation performance, current transport issues and future vision based on the outcomes reviewed by the working groups
- Regional Action Program: 5-year's (2022-2026) top-level transport development plan established by the Ministerial Conference on Transport

4. Regional Action Program for Sustainable Transport Development in Asia and the Pacific (2022-2026)

- Adopted at the Ministerial Conference on Transport in December 2021
- Maritime and interregional transport connectivity as one of the 7 Thematic areas of work
- RAP activities on sustainable and resilient maritime connectivity
 - Support a systematic regional dialogue on sustainable and resilient maritime
 connectivity, including the promotion of the <u>development of low- and zero-emissions</u>
 green shipping for Asia and the Pacific in close partnership with global and regional
 actors and the shipping industry
 - Assist <u>Small Island Developing States</u> in meeting transport challenges and strengthening resilience to future shocks



Strengthening regional cooperation on sustainable maritime connectivity

5. Maritime and port safety (1)

1) Indicators of achievement on Maritime transport connectivity

- Knowledge products and policy recommendations on enhancing the safety of port and maritime operations
- Development of recommendations on the storage of dangerous goods in port areas

2) Full-scale cooperation with IMO

- MOU between the two organizations to strengthen 'future cooperation in the maritime sector in the Asia-Pacific region (September, 2022)
- Major focus areas
- Marine environment protection and climate change;
- Maritime transport facilitation in support of global and regional trade flows, and
- Maritime safety

5. Maritime and port safety (2)

- On going project: Improving the management of dangerous goods (DG) operations in the port areas in Asia and the Pacific to support sustainable maritime connectivity
- Project purpose:
- Develop technical guidelines (recommendations) to promote safe and effective Dangerous
 Goods management in port areas
- Seeking opportunities such as regional cooperation to enhance port safety for safe managing dangerous goods and development of education and training programs
- Donor: Korea Ports & Harbours Association (KPHA)/Ministry of Oceans and Fisheries (MOF, RoK)
- Main Activities:
- Data collection and analysis
- Develop policy recommendations including technical guidelines
- Organize capacity building workshop to review policy recommendations for enhancing safety management of Dangerous Goods in ports

5. Maritime and port safety (3)

- Cooperation with partners (France, Republic of Korea and Thailand)
- Providing expertise
- Technical cooperation
- Jointly organize capacity building workshop
- Milestone
- Data collection and analysis: On-going (including Survey)
- Droft report: On-going
- Draft policy recommendations: December
- capacity Building Workshop on "Promoting Safety for Dangerous Goods transportation in the Asia Pacific Region"
- Purpose: **Training** for safe management of dangerous goods in ports, **Sharing** best practices, **Reviewing** policy recommendations
- A stepstone for further research and action

6. Way forward

Develop follow-up projects

- Follow-up workshops to disseminate policy recommendations
- Development of a reference manual to improve dangerous goods safety management
- Analytical study: Research on port infrastructure development for marine energy conversion and response

Develop regional cooperative platform for promotion of maritime and port safety

- Reinforcing the current working mechanism
- Collaboration with stakeholders including the private sector
- Developing Maritime Working Group
