

Background

Strong education systems are essential to power the shift to safer, greener, more equitable and just societies. Learning about climate and environmental protection, in addition to developing 21st century skills, can strengthen an individual's resilience, including the ability to think critically and other socio-emotional competencies that are central for environmental and climate action. Building a more secure, sustainable world where every boy and girl can fully achieve their potential requires prioritizing and financing education.

The world's interconnected crises, from climate change to economic and food security, affect the well-being of children, denying them their basic rights. Estimates show that 244 million children will not set foot in a classroom this year, while 1 billion are at extremely high risk of suffering from the climate crisis, impacting their health and ability to learn. The economic downturn and debt challenges force the poorest families to decide whether and which children can go to school. Girls are often more at risk of dropping out of school and being forced into domestic labour and early marriage.

This event will highlight new research on the impacts of the climate crisis, country progress, young people's perspectives, and the power of multisectoral partnerships, including UNESCO's Greening Education Partnership, to innovatively address the impacts of climate on children through education.

Key Questions and Outcomes

This side event will examine the following key guiding questions:


- How are the climate and learning crises impacting poverty, gender equality and economic stability?
- What is the impact of these crises on children and young people? What are their recommendations?
- How are countries responding to these crises and using education to advance climate action?
- What is the role of education in climate action? How can investing in education and climate contribute to sustainable development, children's wellbeing and achieving gender equality and inclusion?
- How can climate financing be more child-responsive and used to support education and children's learning outcomes?

Through a diverse panel, our side event aims to amplify the voices of children and young people, highlighting the profound impact of climate on their ability to survive, thrive, and learn; and highlight education's role in achieving SDG 13. Anticipated outcomes involve fostering multi-stakeholder dialogue among countries, youth, and civil society to jointly address climate and education crises. We aim to encourage cross-sector collaboration
















on climate issues by sharing concrete program and financing examples. Furthermore, we seek to build momentum for the UNESCO Greening Education Partnership and advocate for climate-smart education systems in the Asia-Pacific region.


