





# Fifth Pacific Forum on Sustainable Development and Capacity Building Workshop for Pacific SIDS

Implementation of the 2030 Agenda in the Context of COVID-19 and the Climate Emergency

25-26 November 2021

#### **CONCEPT NOTE & AGENDA**

#### **Context and Background**

The prolonged COVID-19 pandemic is affecting the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, particularly in small island developing States (SIDS). At the same time, there has been a strong consensus that pandemic responses should not undermine the continued effort on and collective commitment to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the Paris Agreement. Accelerating the implementation of the SDGs will support countries' recovery plans, to build back better and improve resilience against future pandemics and climate change.

The recently released Sixth Assessment Report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC AR6) confirms that the Pacific and other small islands are the most vulnerable to climate change and are already experiencing its devastating effects. The report reconfirms that sea-level rise is irreversible and that the 1.5 degrees threshold could be breached within the next 15 years (i.e., 2030) with the eventual consequence of the ocean dying from heat and carbon (acidification) and corals being wiped out along with fisheries and livelihoods.

The report provides world leaders with the most timely and accurate information on climate change ahead of the crucial climate summit (COP26) in Glasgow, UK in November 2021. Much more political leadership is needed to tackle climate change, just as the UN Secretary-General has called for the *most ambitious* climate actions for rapid transition to cleaner energy; and for leaders of governments, business and civil society to *unite* behind the goal of keeping the 1.5 degrees threshold alive. The UN Secretary-General also highlighted the *economic and moral imperatives* of protecting the lives and livelihoods of those on the frontline suffering the most. The UN Secretary-General also reiterated the call for COVID-19 response spending must be in line with the priorities of the Paris Agreement.

The recent Forum Leaders' Meeting endorsed regional positions on COVID-19, including the strengthening of regional pandemic, and disaster, planning and resilience. It also endorsed key messages in preparation for COP26:

- (i) reaffirming climate change as the single greatest threat facing the Blue Pacific;
- (ii) reiterating that COVID-19 must not delay global climate actions but promote recovery investments that are climate smart and in line with low emissions development; and
- (iii) advancing the work on Oceans under UNFCCC.

The Forum Leaders also endorsed the Declaration on Preserving the Maritime Zones in the Face of Climate Change-related Sea-Level Rise; and the Framework for Energy Security and Resilience in the Pacific 2021-2030. The issue of climate mobility (relating to migration, displacement and relocation) is the being submitted by Climate Vulnerable Countries (including PIF Members) to COP26 as one their priorities and the development of an appropriate regional framework for the short and medium term is under active consideration by a Joint Working Group co-chaired by Fiji and Tuvalu and inclusive of other Member States and relevant CROP and UN organizations.

These Pacific priorities are consistent with ESCAP Resolution 77/1 'Building back better from crises through regional cooperation in Asia and the Pacific'. The Asia-Pacific regional mandates also support recent decisions by the Pacific Ministers of Foreign Affairs, Economy and Trade on:

- (i) promoting COVID-19 recovery strategies and policies at regional and national levels in support of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Paris Agreement;
- (ii) enhancing national social protection and inclusion and strengthening regional cooperation for support;
- (iii) promoting regional integration and cooperation including on trade connectivity, energy and the digital economy; and
- (iv) better access to, and use of, development and climate finance for recovery and resilience building.

At the global level, the High-level Political Forum (HLPF) continues to serve as the main platform for dialogue on SDG implementation. In 2022, the HLPF will review in 2022 SDGs 4, 5, 14, 15 and 17 under the theme "Building back better from COVID-19 while advancing the full implementation of the 2030 Agenda". The Asia-Pacific Forum for Sustainable Development (APFSD) is the Asia-Pacific regional forum for the HLPF and recognized as such by the Pacific Forum Leaders through their *Pacific Roadmap for Sustainable Development*. Along with the APFSD, the 2022 ESCAP Commission with the theme "A common agenda to advance sustainable development in Asia and the Pacific" will facilitate SDG implementation by contextualizing global efforts and scaling up regional and sub-regional cooperation and synergies to contribute to national aspirations.

As in previous years, the Pacific Forum on Sustainable Development (PFSD) will include a capacity building workshop for the implementation and review of the 2030 Agenda with a focus on follow-up actions highlighted through Voluntary National Review (VNR). Typical follow-up actions from VNRs presented by Pacific SIDS include:

- (i) facilitating meaningful stakeholder engagement and mechanisms for institutionalized consultation with civil society;
- (ii) deepening integration of the SDGs into national sustainable development strategies and development plans and budgets;
- (iii) accessing predictable and effective financing for development; and
- (iv) strengthening data availability and national monitoring and evaluation systems.

#### **Objectives**

The Pacific Forum for Sustainable Development, which is the Pacific preparatory multi-stakeholder meeting for APFSD, provides a unique platform to share perspectives and learn from one another on common priorities and approaches to address, inter alia, COVID-19 and the climate change crisis facing the Pacific member States.

The PFSD will include discussion on the progress in SDG implementation with a focus on SDGs 4, 5, 14, 15 and 17. A related objective is to build capacity around the VNRs, with a focus on implementation of follow-up actions.

#### Organization

The Government of Fiji will co-host the PFSD and the capacity building workshop with ESCAP. Selected development partners, including the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat (PIFS), Pacific Community (SPC) and relevant UN agencies, together with CSO representatives, will be involved in the delivery of substantive sessions.

- 1. Representatives from UN member States in the Pacific;
- 2. National Planning, Statistics and VNR focal points;
- 3. Representatives of CROP organizations, Development Partners and UN agencies; and
- 4. Private sector, academia, think tanks, and civil society representatives.

#### **Expected Outcome**

The outcome of the PFSD will include clear messages, priorities and recommendations from the Pacific to inform deliberations at the 2022 APFSD and the report to the HLPF.

## Session 3: Regional Cooperation for Accelerating Climate-Smart Trade and Sustainable Energy Transition
