
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CAREC Strategy 2020-2025



Climate information gaps







National Hydromet services keep most of their data and information products restricted: openly and freely available information is still scarce, except for weather forecasts.



Limitations in climate services include outdated climate reference data, difficult-to-find climate analysis, reports and yearbooks; state institutional users have privileged access.



Weak coverage of the remote and mountain locations by hydromet networks creates observation gaps. Scientific and institutional weather stations are not integrated into the national systems.



Data analysis and visualizations are weak; technical and scientific formats predominate.



Official climate change communications are difficult to find; upto-date climate data is scarce, and international sources are preferred.




Central Asian Counties
