## **Description:**

As of 2022, over 55% of the world's population lives in cities, a percentage that is expected to increase to 68% by 2050 due to rapid urbanisation<sup>1</sup>. This urban growth has led to the growth of informal settlements, often associated with poverty, hunger, and gender inequality. To tackle the intersectional challenges preventing the achievement of SDGs 1, 2, and 5, a multi-sectoral approach within city development guided by the intergovernmental agreements like the New Urban Agenda (2016), updated priorities identified through UN-Habitat's updated strategic plans and stakeholder engagement, and civil society priorities like those developed by the

World Urban Campaign's The City We Need Now call to action (2022)<sup>2</sup> are essential, particularly within the Asia Pacific Region, where the female poverty rate is 30.9%.<sup>3</sup>
