Opening Remarks by Anis Chowdhury, Director ESCAP-Statistics Division

Good Morning Once Again

Having read the message from our Executive Secretary, let me now also welcome you and congratulate you. You are the torch-bearers of some internationally renowned and leading statisticians such as P.C. Mahalanobis who was the chair of the 2nd Session in 1952 of the Regional Conference of Statisticians of Asia and the Far East (RCOS), the predecessor of the current ESCAP Committee on Statistics. 17.18 by 2020, enhance capacity building support to developing countries, including for LDCs and SIDS, to increase significantly the availability of high-quality, timely and reliable data disaggregated by income, gender, age, race, ethnicity, migratory status, disability, geographic location and other characteristics relevant in national contexts

17.19 by 2030, build on existing initiatives to develop measurements of progress on sustainable development that complement GDP, and support statistical capacity building in developing countries

are remarkably similar to the two strategic goals that CST has set at its 2nd Session in 2010.

Your leadership also led to the first Ministerial Conference on CRVS which has declared the 2015-2024 as the decade of CRVS by when the countries are expected to improve the coverage of CRVS to 100%. Hopefully, you will be endorsing the outcome document and the regional action programme for CRVS. This would mean, this region would be ahead of the one of targets, i.e. by 2030 provide legal identity for all including birth registration under the proposed goal 16.

Thus, I strongly believe, this session, which takes place at a critical juncture, will also decide on issues that will be crucial for statistics development not only in the region, but also globally.
